

9. The exchange list of the Society will not be increased at present to include the Science Museum, of London, or the Far East Dept. of the Academy of Science, Vladivostok.

10. A meeting will be held at Salt Lake City the week of June 12 if Vice-President Henry B. Hersey and Mr. J. Cecil Alter, hereby appointed a committee on arrangements and reports, deem it advisable. This committee has power to add to itself, to take charge of the program, and to incur expenses not exceeding \$10.00 without further authorization.

12. The BULLETIN will be continued without reduction from the large 1932 size, 248 pages, thanks to reduced printing costs.

13. The Council favors a 50% enlargement of the BULLETIN to 32 pages a month.

14. The BULLETIN will be enlarged, according to contributions received for the purpose, in units of 4 pages for every \$20 received. Of each \$20, \$4 will go to the editor for extra assistance and \$16 will be available for the printer. The Council noted with pleasure Mr. R. E. Horton's offer to finance a quarter of a 4-page monthly increase and Mr. C. M. Saville's willingness to be one of 20 to contribute \$200 for enlarging the BULLETIN.

15. The editing of the BULLETIN will be left in charge of the Secretary, in consultation with the Council.

THE CHICAGO MEETING

June 19 and 20 have been set as the tentative dates for the meeting of the American Meteorological Society as part of the great scientific gathering at the Century of Progress exposition in Chicago. There will probably be two symposia, both led by Prof. J. Bjerknes, the distinguished Norwegian meteorologist, invited by the Century of Progress to take part in the meeting. One symposium will be on "Radiation and General Circulation of the Atmosphere;" the other will be on the "Dynamics of Extratropical Cyclones." Prof. Bjerknes will present papers on "A Theory of the General Circulation of the Atmosphere," "On the Dynamics of Penetrative Convection," and a general lecture on "Atmospheric Soundings. Methods and Results." A session will probably be devoted largely to the progress of meteorology since 1833, and there will be a session or more for papers on various subjects. All who can attend and who wish to offer papers on the subjects of the symposia, on meteorological history, or on any other meteorological subject are invited to submit titles, from which the program can be selected.—*H.
