I do, however, feel that there ought to be some work on humidity. I never have had time to work out humidity,

but I do believe that because it covers so many other factors it ought to give us some good results. I understand that humidity has been used in making cotton estimates, but I do not know whether any such work has been done in the grain states.—

KANSAS CITY MEETING, JUNE 11-12, 1936

At the invitation of the Kansas City Seminar the Council voted in January to hold a meeting at Kansas City in June, the local group to take charge of the program and arrangements. Since all the other summer meetings will be on the East and West coasts, this will give those in the central parts of the country especially a chance to enjoy a fine program that has already been tentatively outlined. A large attendance is expected as there are generally 60 or more local members and others who come to the regular meetings of the Seminar alone. Arrangements are being made with railroads, air lines, and hotels to give marked reductions in rates for those attending; also, special entertainment at one of the small lake resorts near Kansas City can be arranged for a nominal charge so that those planning their vacation trips at that time could stop over two days while attending the

meeting and still assure their families having a good time.

Two days of sessions are planned and the second Thursday and Friday of the month, the 11th and 12th, have been definitely chosen; it is hoped to have special emphasis on radio-meteorographs, climatology, and river and flood forecasting on the first day, and synoptic meteorology the second.

There will be four sessions: Thursday afternoon and evening, with supper at the Ambassador Hotel; Friday morning and afternoon, with luncheon together and evening banquet (\$0.75). Some eminent workers in the field have been invited to present papers. Meetings will probably be held in the TWA conference room and the University of Kansas City, which institutions, as well as others, have very generously offered their facilities. More detailed announcements will be made in later BULLETINS.

SEATTLE MEETING, JUNE 16-20, 1936

The Council has voted to have a meeting of the Society at Seattle, June 16-20, at the time of the meeting of the Pacific Division, American Association for the Advancement of Science at that place at the University of Washington. The Council appointed Lawrence C. Fisher of the

Weather Bureau, and Phil E. Church of the Geography Department of the University, as a committee on arrangements. Those members contemplating presenting papers at this meeting are requested to communicate at this time with the committee.
