New Tornado and Hurricane Films and Videotapes

Requests for the 24-minute "Terrible Tuesday" and the 28-minute "Hurricane" films and videotapes from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)-related agencies should be directed to Ms. Stacey Gerard, FEMA Public Affairs, 500 C Street, S.W., Washington, DC 20742, telephone 202-287-0318.

Requests for the films and videotapes from the general public should be referred to the National Audiovisual Center, General Services Administration, Washington, DC 20409, telephone 301-763-1896. Cost for the "Terrible Tuesday" film will be \$245.00; \$90.00 for the videotape. Cost for the "Hurricane" film and videotape will probably be about the same.

The "Terrible Tuesday" film and videotape should be at National Weather Service field stations. One copy was sent to each Weather Service Forecast Office and a copy of the film to each Weather Service Office in the Eastern, Central, and Southern regions. These offices will receive six copies of the film and videotape. Twelve copies of the film and five copies of the videotape will be sent to the Western Region Headquarters for distribution there. One copy of the film and videotape will be sent to the Pacific and Alaska regions. More copies of the film will be made available at a later date.
